About the Keynote Speakers

MOIRA SHANNON OAM was awarded South Australia Senior Australian of the Year 2006. In 1978, Moira established a women's shelter, serving the Eyre Peninsula. This was a very significant achievement in the environment of the time, when women's shelters were viewed as a confronting new movement. Now called Yarredi services, it continues to be a valued community service. Seeing the number of young people brought to the shelter, she started West Coast Youth Services in 1985. Moira retired in 1998 but hasn't stopped working. She saw another need and started yet another project - supported accommodation services for disabled people. Moira has forged herself as a community leader and a strong advocate for many who suffer through social and economic disadvantage.

DR DIANA OLSBERG PhD FAICD is an Economic Sociologist. She is Head of the School of Sociology and Anthropology at the University of New South Wales. Her current research interests include sociological and economic aspects of ageing, in particular the values, attitudes and aspirations of Australia's Baby Boom Generation. She has recently completed the largest national study of the residential intentions and family relationships of 7000 men and women aged 50 years and over for the Australian Housing and Urban Research Institute (AHURI). The project 'Ageing in Place: intergenerational and intrafamilial housing transfers and shifts in later life' has created widespread interest both in Australia and overseas. Diana is also well-known and widely published for her work on cross-national comparisons of Australia's national retirement income system.

Until March last year, **WARWICK BRUEN** was the Assistant Secretary, Community Care Branch, in the Australian Government Department of Health and Ageing. In this position he was responsible nationally for the Home and Community Care Program, Community Aged Care Packages, Extended Aged Care in the Home, National Respite for Carers Program, National Continence Management Program, Carer Support Programs, Aged Care Assessment Program, the Dementia Education and Support Program and a range of other smaller community care programs funded by the Australian Government.

Warwick Bruen's main interests have been how to apply the results of research and evaluation to policy development and program management. He has been particularly interested in the management of dementia and in the design and evaluation of community care programs for people with dementia.

Since leaving full time employment Warwick Bruen has been involved in working with a number of non Government organisations, including Alzheimer's Australia and UnitingCare.

PROFESSOR LEON FLICKER is the inaugural Professor of Geriatric Medicine at the University of Western Australia and has held that position since 1998. He completed his training in geriatric medicine in Sydney, Newcastle and Melbourne and completed a PhD at the University of Melbourne. He has published over 110 peer reviewed articles. Professor Flicker's research interests have focused on the diagnosis, assessment and management of the common medical conditions of older people, particularly in the areas of osteoporosis and dementia. He is the Immediate Past President of the Australian Society for Geriatric Medicine.

GRAEME HUGO is Federation Fellow, Professor of the Department of Geographical and Environmental Studies and Director of the National Centre for Social Applications of Geographic Information Systems at the University of Adelaide. His research interests are in population issues in Australia and South East Asia, especially migration. His books include Australia's Changing Population (Oxford University Press), The Demographic Dimension in Indonesian Development (with T. H. Hull, V. J. Hull and G. W. Jones, Oxford University Press), International Migration Statistics: Guidelines for Improving Data Collection Systems (with A.S. Oberai, H. Zlotnik and R. Bilborrow, International Labour Office), Worlds in Motion: Understanding International Migration at Century's End (with D. S. Massey, J. Arango, A. Kouaouci, A. Pellegrino and J. E. Taylor, Oxford University Press), several of the 1986, 1991 and 1996 census based Atlas of the Australian People Series (AGPS), Australian Immigration: A Survey of the Issues (with M. Wooden, R. Holton and J. Sloan, AGPS), New Forms of Urbanisation: Beyond the Urban-Rural Dichotomy (with A. Champion, Ashgate) and Australian Census Analytic Program: Australia's Most Recent Immigrants (Australian Bureau of Statistics). In 2002 he secured an ARC Federation Fellowship over five years for his research project, "The new paradigm of international migration to and from Australia: dimensions, causes and implications".
