

The 2023 grant round opens on Wed 1 March 2023 and closes on Fri 14 April 2023

## Introduction

These guidelines are designed to support applications for an RM Gibson Program grant made available through the AAG Research Trust. For the purposes of these guidelines, the term 'applicant' refers to the lead investigator (researcher or practitioner) on the proposed project. The proposed project may be undertaken in a research or practitioner setting.

## About the RM Gibson Program

The RM Gibson Program, formerly known as the RM Gibson Research Fund, supports early career researchers and practitioners working across the multidisciplinary field of ageing. The RM Gibson Program aims to develop and support the next generation of researchers in ageing. Grants are awarded for work that improves the experience of ageing through innovation in research, policy and/or practice. Priorities and funding are reviewed on an annual basis by the Steering Committee of the AAG Research Trust.

In 2023, the RM Gibson Program is offering:

- Up to three grants of up to \$10,000 (inc GST) each, for projects up to 18 months in duration; and
- A possible additional grant of up to \$10,000 (inc GST), for projects up to 18 months in duration for applications with a substantive dementia focus, made possible through a partnership between the AAG Research Trust and the Dementia Australia Research Foundation (DARF).

Adjustments to the amount provided under each grant may be recommended by the grants committee.

## Grant eligibility and conditions

These grants support work undertaken by early career post-graduate researchers and/or practitioners (that is, people studying or working in the field of ageing, at an early stage of their career). Where the application relates to an existing program of work, the proposed project must be a stand-alone piece of work with a new independent output (e.g. publication or resource) for which the applicant is the lead investigator.

## Eligibility criteria

To apply for an RM Gibson Program grant:

1. Applicants must be financial members of AAG at the time of applying for a grant and for the duration of the funded project.
2. The work must be undertaken in Australia.
3. Projects made possible through the 2023 grant round must be completed within 18 months from confirmation of the award. For projects involving Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander peoples, an extension may be granted.
4. Applicants are responsible for securing all necessary insurances and approvals (including by a human research ethics committee) before commencing the funded project.
5. If different AAG Research Trust grant programs run at the same time, applicants can apply for a grant from more than one program, but the projects must be different.
6. Applications will not be accepted from a lead investigator who currently holds an AAG Research Trust grant of any kind, or who has previously received an RM Gibson award.

7. Applicants may be the lead investigator on one grant application only per funding round, but may be a co-investigator on applications made by another lead investigator.
8. Applicants whose proposed project involves community organisations or services are required to provide a letter of support from the organisation or service to confirm their interest in participating.
9. Applications who are unsuccessful in one funding group may apply in a future funding round.

## Exclusions

Applications will not be accepted:

1. Where the applicant is a current lead investigator in any AAG Research Trust grant of any kind.
2. Where the applicant is a current AAG director (as corporate trustee of the AAG Research Trust), a member of the AAG Research Trust Steering Committee or Grants Committee, or a member of a grant review panel. However, they may be listed as a co-applicant on an application.

## Eligible items

The application should describe the feasibility of the project in terms of resourcing, either solely through this grant or combined with additional sources of funding or in-kind support. Where a proposed project is part of a larger program of work, applicants should describe any grants from other funding bodies and clearly demonstrate the unique contribution of the work for which this funding is sought.

All items to be funded by the grant must be justified in the application. The items that may be covered by a grant include, but are not limited to:

1. A component of the applicant's salary for the time to be spent on the project.
2. Travel costs directly related to the project.
3. Purchase of equipment, venue hire and catering costs directly related to the project.
4. Reimbursement or incentives for project participants.
5. Registration and travel to present the findings of the project at an AAG Conference, up to a combined maximum of \$1,000 of the total grant (noting that acceptance of presentation abstracts is subject to peer review and endorsement by the AAG Conference Scientific Committee).
6. Salaries for assistants required directly for the project.
7. Printing and publication costs (e.g. hard copies of surveys, resources, open access publication etc).
8. Ethics committee review costs.

## Ineligible items

The following items will not be funded:

1. Infrastructure, administrative or other indirect costs (e.g. equipment that would normally be provided by an institution, or utilities and services).
2. Travel, equipment, or other costs not directly related to the proposed project.
3. Institutional or organisational overheads or administrative fees.

## Application process

All applications must address each item in the application form. In addition, all applications must be:

- Made using the form available on the AAG Research Trust website.
- Combined into a single pdf file containing the completed form and relevant letters of support.
- Saved as: 2023RMG\_First name\_Last name.
- Submitted through the AAG Research Trust website portal.

Applications submitted in other formats will not be considered.

## Key dates for 2023

In 2023:

- Applications open at 9 am AEDT on Wednesday 1 March 2023.
- Applications close at 11.55 pm AEDT on Friday 14 April 2023.
- Awardees are approved by the AAG Research Trust Steering Committee by Friday 30 June 2023.
- Applicants are informed of the application outcome by 14 July 2023.

## Assessment criteria

Applications must answer each item of the application form, including:

1. How the proposed project aligns with the aim of the RM Gibson Program, namely to develop and support the next generation of researchers in ageing.
2. The anticipated significance, innovation and impact of the work in improving the experience of ageing through innovation in research, policy and/or practice.
3. The process of involving older adults, their carers, and/or other stakeholders in the design and delivery of the project, and recognition of the diversity among them.

Additional criteria apply to projects involving older Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander people and communities (see Attachment 1).

## Assessment process

The Grants Committee of the AAG Research Trust uses a formal protocol to assess applicants against the grant criteria. Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander-led applications and/or those that focus on older Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and their communities are assessed by the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Review Panel of the AAG Research Trust.

The Grant Committee reserves the right to request details of and contact referees with questions about this application.

The decision of the Steering Committee is final and no individual feedback is provided to successful or unsuccessful applicants.

Where possible, grants will be formally awarded at the next AAG National Conference.

## Grant agreement

Awardees will receive a formal letter of offer (constituting the grant agreement) within 90 days of notification of the grant award to the AAG Research Trust, unless otherwise negotiated. This agreement describes the requirements of awardees, including:

- Submission of a detailed project report within 90 days of completing the project, or as otherwise agreed. A template is provided for this report.
- Completion of an online questionnaire, to inform the development of a case study on the awardee and their project for promotion by the AAG Research Trust.
- Submission of an abstract to the next AAG National Conference on the project (acceptance is subject to the AAG Conference Scientific Committee and cannot be guaranteed).
- Agreement to acknowledge the AAG Research Trust RM Gibson Program (and DARE, if applicable) in all publications, presentations, summary findings and media announcements relating to the project.

## Grant payments

Grants will only be paid to an institution with Australian deductible gift recipient (DGR) status. Applicants should seek advice on the DGR status of their institution and any tax implications relating to the grant before applying. Because the AAG Research Trust is exempt from GST, the budget for the proposed project must include GST. The AAG Research Trust cannot provide advice in this regard.

Grant payments are made to the host institution. Thus, any changes to the application's relationship with the host institution must be reported to the AAG Research Trust immediately, for review and decision regarding the impact on the grant.

Grants are paid as a single transaction and on the basis that the host institution will not take an administrative or other fee from the grant. Grants will not be paid directly to individuals.

Awarded monies may only be spent on the approved proposal, unless any variation to the agreed proposal has been approved by the Grants Committee.

If the project is terminated for any reason, or if funds are not expended on the agreed proposal, any unspent funds must be returned to the AAG Research Trust.

## Attachment 1

### Guidelines for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander-led grant applications

#### Introduction

AAG Research Trust seeks to fund Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander-led projects involving older Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. In so doing, its aim is to:

- Support Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander early career researchers and practitioners working across the multidisciplinary field of ageing to build their skills and capacity.
- Develop evidence-based knowledge about ageing in Indigenous Australian communities that takes an Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander perspective and standpoint to inform policy and program development.

The AAG Research Trust's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Review Panel leads the review and selection of projects with an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander focus. Panel members are Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander researchers or practitioners.

#### Guidelines

All applications for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander projects must:

- Be led by an Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander early career researcher or practitioner (the applicant must be the lead investigator).
- Engage with the strengths and positive aspects of ageing in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities and amongst older Indigenous peoples.

The principles developed by the Lowitja Institute apply to any projects funded by the AAG Research Trust and should guide grant applications. The principles are:

- **Beneficence:** To act for the benefit of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in the conduct of our research
- Leadership by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people
- Engagement of research end users (Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander organisations and communities, policymakers, other potential research users)
- Development of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander research workforce, and
- Measurement of impact in improving Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people's health.
