The Australian and New Zealand Society for Geriatric Medicine (ANZSGM) is the professional society for geriatricians and other medical practitioners with an interest in medical care of older people. The Society formed in the early 1970's as the Australian Geriatrics Society, later changed its name to the Australian Society for Geriatric Medicine, and amalgamated in 2006 with the New Zealand Society for Geriatric Medicine, to become the Australian and New Zealand Society for Geriatric Medicine (ANZSGM). ANZSGM Federal Council represents all Australian states and New Zealand, and state divisions all have their own meetings and networks.
