PILAR RIOSECO, AUSTRALIAN DEMOGRAPHIC AND SOCIAL RESEARCH INSTITUTE, ANU

Pilar Rioseco's PhD research focuses on the role of social connectedness in the process of retirement in Australia. Pilar has a BA in Psychology from the Pontificia Universidad Catolica de Chile and a Masters in Social Research from ANU. Pilar is currently working on the Social Networks and Ageing Project, based at ANU, and is a member of the ARC Centre of Excellence in Population Ageing Research. Pilar's research interests are social connectedness, retirement and ageing.

BRIDGET BROWNE, RESEARCH SCHOOL OF FINANCE, ACTUARIAL STUDIES AND APPLIED STATISTICS, ANU

Bridget Browne is a Senior Lecturer in Actuarial Studies at the Australian National University in Canberra. She joined ANU in 2011 after serving as Life Chief Pricing Actuary at Partner Reinsurance Europe Ltd where she was responsible for all aspects of pricing of Partner Re's Life portfolio worldwide, including long term care insurance in several markets. Prior to her work with Partner Re, Bridget worked in a variety of actuarial roles with Zurich Financial Services and Hazell Carr.

SARANG KIM, CENTRE FOR RESEARCH ON AGEING HEALTH AND WELLBEING, ANU

Sarang Kim is a third year PhD candidate based at the Centre for Research on Ageing, Health and Well-being (CRAHW), ANU. Sarang's PhD thesis investigates the effects of the individual's perception of dementia risk and their motivation towards lifestyle and health behavioural changes on the efficacy of dementia prevention interventions.

Kimberly Ashby-Mitchell is an international postgraduate student from the Caribbean island of Trinidad and Tobago and is based at ANU.
